

97% of those are connected to a WWTP


Historical evolution of the compliance rate

Next steps

- Public consultation until 19 October 2018
- 3 stakeholder workshops will be organised to complete the input of the public consultation
 - Emerging pollutants 24 October 2018
 - Storm water overflows and Individual or Appropriate
 Systems 25 October 2018
 - Cost and benefits of the UWWTD 8 November 2018
- End of evaluation: mid-2019



Water Framework Directive (WFD)







Europe's waters today

- Success of European water policy
- UWWTD: reducing pollution from households
- EEA European Waters Report (2018):
 - Point sources: only 18 % of pressures (38% for diffuse sources)
 - 40% of surface waters in good ecological status (little change since first cycle)
 - 38% bodies in good chemical status (97% if ubiquitous priority substances (mercury) not taken into account)



Implementation not complete

Art. 7 (3) Water Framework Directive

(Waters used for the abstraction of drinking water)

• "[...] avoiding deterioration in their quality to reduce the level of purification treatment [..]"

Art. 9 (1) Water Framework Directive

(Recovery of costs for water services)

- "[...] take account of the principle of recovery of the costs of water services, including environmental and resource costs, and in accordance ... with the polluter pays principle [..]"
- "[...] An adequate contribution of the different water uses, disaggregated into at least industry, households and agriculture, to the recovery of the costs of water services [..]"



What do we want?

- Maintain objectives / ambition of the WFD beyond 2027
- Improve communication of progress
- Take account of climate change and its impact
- to avoid end-of-pipe solutions, ensure holistic approach to water pollution based on 'source control' measures.
- Effective policy coordination with relevant EU legislation.
- Consider an extension of the deadline beyond 2027.



Next steps

- Public consultation to be launched ahead of the Vienna Conference
- Vienna EU Water Conference 20-21 September
- REFIT evaluation report by mid-2019
- Revision? Up to the next European Commission




Fertiliser Regulation (FR)







- Goal: Open EU market to organic fertiliser
 - Definition of quality for different Product Function
 Categories (PFC) (fertiliser, soil improvers...)
 - PFC to be made of Component Material Categories
 (CMC) (Raw material, compost, digestate...)
 - For the moment sewage slude is excluded





- Products recovered from sewage sludge might be accepted as new CMC:
 - Struvite
 - Ash-based product
- Currently:
 - Trilogue (EU Parliament, Council, European Commission → Cd discussion is critical
 - STRUBIAS: report by the end of the year
- Adoption expected before EU elections



Water Reuse Regulation (WRR)







- Proposal: end May 2018
- Scope: irrigation only
 - Define the minimum requirements (PoC, quality, risk assessment, permit, control, information to the public)
 - No obligation
 - Possibility to enforce the minimum
- Issues:
 - All responsibility on the operator
 - Validation of the process



Next steps

- 25 September 2018: Report of the EU Parliament to be submitted
- 25 October: Amendments
- January 2019: Committee vote (Parliament)
- Feb-March 2019: Plenary vote (Parliament)
- Adoption: Probably after the elections due to low interest in Council



Single-Use Plastics (SUP) Directive







- Goal: Reduction of environmental impact of SUP
- Included: wet wipes
 - Labelling
 - Awareness raising campaigns
 - Extended producer responsibility
- EurEau: include impact on WW infrastructure



Next steps

- 10-11 October 2018: Committee vote (Parliament)
- End October: Plenary mandate (Parliament)
- Until January 2019: Trilogue with Member States
